102nd VASSAR President's Annual Report

February 1, 2023

I have been honored to serve as the Virginia Society President from February 2022 to present.

The major focus of Virginia SAR this year has been to prepare for the 250th anniversary of the Revolution. Our chapters now have the guidance and tools in place to ensure the Virginia SAR will continue to promote patriotism, honor the service of our Patriot ancestors and foster good relationship among the descendants of those patriots. In 2021, a 250th committee was formed, in 2022 VASSAR has restructured the state program committees into Regions, Color Guard and information technology to prepare for the anniversary.

The first step to provide support is a regional committee structure. The 31 chapters are divided into 4 regional committees. These regional committees include 7 to 8 chapter presidents, a chairman and 3 vice chairs. The Chair and vice chairmen attend meetings of the state programs and committees chaired by the 3 Virginia SAR Vice Presidents. As liaisons they bring information to the Chapters at the regional meetings. Our goal is to improve cooperation between chapters and increase support for the Chapters from the states programs and committees. In 2022 these regional committees were asked to 3 meetings during the year. The meetings were conducted via zoom. I hope chapter Presidents will see the value of these meetings and continue to be active members of the regions in 2023.

The 2nd step was to provide guidance for the Chapter President on operational issues like accidents, incidents, and color guard support. The VASSAR Color Guard lead by Com-

mander Melhuish has created accident and incident guidelines, reviewed insurance coverage to provide coverage for musket demonstrations and created a wallet card for quick reference on steps to take if an accident occurs. These policy improvements combined with increased training workshops, tracking of Color Guard training, and revision of the CG handbook will ensure our Color Guard continue to be the excellent representatives of the Virginia SAR.

The 3rd is a complete rebuild of the State websites in addition Virginia will be implementing a membership management system using MemberClick services. The services improvements include mass email capabilities, accepting online payments, forms for events, and workspaces for committees. Compatriots are able to update contact information, browse VASSAR history and connect with other VASSAR compatriots.

The Virginia SAR has been active, as President from February 12th I have attended more than 70 events.

The Virginia SAR partnered with the VA C.A.R. to fund a new theater system at the Yorktown National Park for the new field on the Battle of Yorktown.

The Virginia SAR partnered with the Lafayette Trail Association to fund a marker in Jeffersonton, Virginia.

The Color Guard held 2 workshops and well over 100 events from Grave marking to summer camps. Attending these events I was honored to meet many Compatriots throughout Virginia and see the communities they serve.

It has been a privilege and honor to serve as President of the Virginia SAR. I will always be grateful for the support you have all given me over this year.

COLONEL JAMES WOOD II CHAPTER

The Colonel James Wood II Chapter was organized in 2007 at the behest of Virginia Past President Jim Bayne. He was looking to start a new chapter in the northern Shenandoah Valley and western areas of the State. His compatriot Al White agreed to take the lead in starting a new chapter in Northwest Virginia. It was determined that a viable chapter was needed to cover the five county area, which include Clarke, Frederick, Page, Shenandoah and Warren Counties. The chapter was named for Colonel James Wood II, a son of the founding father of Winchester. James II, was deputy surveyor of Frederick County, served in the Virginia House of Burgesses from 1766-1776 and in the Virginia Constitutional Convention in 1776. Wood negotiated the Treaty of Fort Pitt with the Shawnee Indians in 1775, making possible the successful expedition of General George Rogers Clark. He fought in the Revolutionary War, commanding the Virginia Regiment at the Battle of Brandywine and later named a Brigadier General of Virginia troops. He served as governor of Virginia from 1796-1799. The chapter was formally chartered on 29 November 2007 at Strasburg, Virginia by Virginia President Joseph W. Dooley. NSSAR President General Bruce Wilcox was present and charged the membership with carrying out the goals and objectives of the Society. This became a quest that has made it to a most successful chapter. The chapter quickly became involved in meeting its objectives. In 2009, it the won Best Medium Chapter in Virginia, an award the repeated in 2010. It was in 2011 they had earned the Sustained Revolutionary Grave Marking award, followed in 2011 with the Revolutionary Grave Registration Streamer. The chapter grew in size and in activity. In 2013, they began a streak of 8 consecutive Best Large Chapter in Virginia Awards along with Chapter Excellence Awards. In 2019, they were awarded the USS Stark Memorial Award as the top large chapter in NSSAR supporting veterans during 2018. In 2020, they were presented the Liberty Bell Award as top large chapter in NSSAR. For their effort in 2020, the CJWII Chapter was presented the Best Very Large Chapter in

Virginia, the USS Stark Memorial Award, the President General's Activity Award and the Liberty Bell Award as the top NSSAR chapter within their membership category. For 2021, they were again presented the Best Very Large Chapter in Virginia and the USS Stark Memorial Award. They were recognized for having the top Americanism point total in the chapter membership category, however, a chapter cannot win two years in a row, therefore earning Honorary Mention status. In 15 years of service, they have earned 139 streamers or stars for continued excellence in meeting the goals and objectives of the SAR. The chapter has a top color guard unit, a solid Revolutionary War Graves Program and a strong veterans support program. Due to the quality of its members, outstanding stewardship of the chapter by the BOM and support from the surrounding community, the Colonel James Wood II Chapter has risen to prominence as one of the best chapters in Virginia.



Chapter flag of the Col. James Wood II Chapter. It is a modern interpretation of the regimental flag of the Virginia 8th Regiment in the Revolutionary War. The 8th was called the "German Regiment" because of the large number of German Soldiers from the Shenando-ah Valley. It was commanded by Peter Muhlenberg who spoke both German and English.

MemberClicks Professional

The Virginia State Society (VASSAR) is pleased to announce the forthcoming implementation of a new membership management system from MemberClicks Professional. This system will reduce the workload for state officers and chapter officers by providing a communications tool, event registration tool and automation tool for dues renewal and event payments through a payment processor linked directly to state and chapter accounts.

MemberClicks Professional (MCPro) will provide the state and chapters with the ability to consolidate membership communication using a single platform for membership contact data, online event registration, event request forms, VASSAR calendar and the ability to pay dues online.

Members and prospective members will also have the ability to update their own contact information and other member specific information. VASSAR officers and chapter officers will have the ability to use this system for broadcast communication to membership and partner organizations, create profiles for perspective members to ensure they are included in updates to VASSAR, chapter news and provide a database for contact information for various other VASSAR interests such as media, DAR chapter representatives and CAR leadership.

Ultimately, this system will provide for increased retention and participation through the engagement of direct communication with membership across VASSAR and event coordination through a calendar, open to chapters and managed by chapters and committees. With dues payment and event payment automation and member-controlled contact information updates, this tool should reduce the administrative

time our volunteer chapter and state officers commit to such activities, freeing them up from manual entry administrative tasks, creating more time for chapter and community engagement activities.

Every chapter with an active website will be provided a link directly to the MCPro member portal. MCPro will be the new host for the VASSAR Dispatches with an integrated events calendar, event registration forms and other forms such as Color Guard request. MemberClicks will be the central management system for the VASSAR database of members, which is synchronized with the NSSAR database annually to ensure we have an accurate and current count of active and non-active members (opportunity to reengage with members who may have lapsed). To protect personally identifiable information, Member-Click's data storage meets federal and industry standard data security provisions and VAS-SAR will limit member profile information access to state and chapter officers who require access to the contact information today.

The Story of an Unremarkable Patriot

250 Years Ago or Thereabouts

The story I am about to tell concerns a person of French extraction who enters the Colonies from then British Canada and joins the American Patriots cause. Like any self-respecting young Frenchman of the time, he was ready to fight the British. He became an American in the process. He probably didn't think himself to be in any way remarkable.

The story begins in Liöle (modern day Lisle near the Belgian border), France, where one Ignace (Ignatius) François Delezenne marries a Christine Jacquement in 1748. Shortly thereafter, for reasons unknown, they brave an Atlantic crossing to the then French-controlled area of Trois Rivières, Québec. He specializes in making silver church altar candelabra, chalices, patens and related Communion vessels.

In 1750, Ignace and Christine have a child named, Joseph Christopher Delezenne. Providentially, for this story, four years later, in 1754, a Mary Dusenbury is born in Holland. We will return to her in due course.

With the British victorious in the French and Indian War (the Six Years' War, 1756-1763), Quebec falls under English rule. Trois Riviéres, was the site of a defeat of the Americans, led by Brigadier General William Thompson, on June 8, 1776, by General Charles Burgoyne. Whether or not Joseph Christopher Delezenne was still there or not, we do not know. What is known is that the 26-year-old Frenchman decided to follow the St. Lawrence River down to the Colony of New York, settling in the area of Westchester County.

No doubt caught up in the Rebel fervor of 1776, he elected to cast his lot with the Patriot Cause and joins the Continental Army. According to the records, the first combat he sees is in the ignominious surrender by Patriot General Arthur St. Clair of Ft. Ticonderoga to Burgoyne and the British after a brief skirmish in July of 1777. In the fall of that year, he fought at the Battle of Saratoga, a stunning victory for the America forces. Two days after the victory, on October 17, 1777, he receives a Captain's commission in the New York Continental Line, Engineers and Sappers, under the command of the Polish freedom fighter, then a Colonel Thaddeus Koscius-ko. It might be noted here that other French Engineers had been seconded secretly to the Americans by the French government, which, a year later would declare war against England and render critical assistance to the American Revolution. The fact that Delezenne joins the Engineers is probably not coincidental.

While wintering with General Washington's troops at Valley Forge, he sought leave to return to Westchester County and marries the previously mentioned of Dutch extraction, Mary Dusenbury, whose family has also moved to the Colonies and has settled in Westchester County.

During the Southern Campaign of the Independence War, we find that Captain Delezenne is still serving under now, General Kosciusko, under the Campaign Command of General Nathanael Greene. In particular, he is noted as leading the zigzagging siege trench construction on horseback, of the British-and Tory Militia-controlled Fort Ninety Six, in May/June 1781, in South Carolina. Early in September of that year, he is wounded in the hand at the Battle of Eutaw Springs north of Charleston. In the following month, Lord General Cornwallis would surrender his army at the Battle of Yorktown in Virginia. The larger war would in short order

come to a conclusion, with the Treaty of Paris in 1783, and the granting of independence to the newly formed United States of America. Captain Delezenne finished out the war stationed at West Point under the command of Colonel Pechefontaine when the Continental Army was disbanded in November, 1783.

The story of this unremarkable member of the Continental Line, Christopher Joseph and Christine have a son, Joseph E. Delezenne. He would marry Sarah Ann Drayton, who was born interestingly enough in Castletown, in Dorset, England, and emigrates to America and marries young Joseph in February of 1812, the year America returns to war with England. They have a daughter, Sarah Ann who marries a fellow from Philadelphia by the name of Robert Baker. In the meantime, the unremarkable Patriot dies in 1828, at the age of 78.

Life marches on. Sarah and Robert have a daughter, Sarah Matilda, who, just prior to the outbreak of the Civil War, marries a fellow Philadelphian, in 1859, by the name of Henry Theophilus Phillips, whose parents were of Welsh and English extraction and arrived in America through the port of Philadelphia in 1832. This couple, of all places, get married in the old city of Detroit, the site of earlier French and then English forts on the Detroit River at the mouth of Lake St. Clair. They have a daughter, Sarah Evelyn Phillips a year later.

In time, Sarah Evelyn agrees to marry a young man, originally from London, Ontario, Canada, who had moved down to Detroit. This fellow is the owner of a general store and is a famed hunting and fishing guide. He was successful enough to send a gift of a twelve brace of quail as a gift for Queen Victoria for her Diamond Jubilee in 1897.

So, what is the point of this long story? Well, Sarah Evelyn Phillips' husband was William Hall

Williams, and he was my great grandfather. And now, you know... the rest of the story.



VASSAR Liability and Black Powder Insurance

Last year, VASSAR purchased a General Liability Policy with an insurance company to provide protection for events arising from VASSAR mission activities, as a non-profit organization. Unfortunately, upon further examination, this insurance company never confirmed in writing that the liability coverage extended to firing events by our VASSAR Color Guard (CG).

In June 2022, the VASSAR President authorized a special insurance committee be appointed to address the liability insurance issue. The Chairman is the VASSAR CG Commander and includes two Compatriots who are licensed insurance agents.

The VASSAR Insurance Committee initiated a search to find an insurance company which would agree to underwrite third party liability coverage (for both bodily injury and property damage) for VASSAR, the entity, and the activities of our VASSAR Color Guard members who conduct the firing of blank cartridges using black powder at VASSAR or non-VASSAR sanctioned events.

As we learned, several other state societies have retained Lockton (an insurance broker) to arrange third party liability coverage for their State Society's Color Guard activities. Lockton is the world's largest privately held insurance brokerage firm. Lockton operates in over 100 locations and in 125 countries. Lockton currently employs over 9,000 people worldwide and its 2021 global revenues exceed \$ 2.2 billion. Our choice was to select Lockton, as our broker. Our insurance underwriter, Acceptance Indemnity Insurance Company, is A.M. Best rated as A- (which is Excellent).

An early encouraging sign in the negotiation process was the fact that the insurance underwriter actually knew the difference between a musket and a rifle! We quickly structured a policy for black powder firings, which applied to all VASSAR members in good standing (e.g. their membership had not expired); coverage extended to VASSAR and non-VASSAR firing events in Virginia or outside Virginia, as reported by the VASSAR CG Commander to Lockton (the coverage travels with you); the elimination of any policy deductibles; and the Deposit Premium would be based on the initial listing of declared VASSAR events for the policy year. The deposit premium will be audited at the end of the policy year (in July), as to the final, final number of VASSAR reported events during the policy year; and a premium adjustment would be made accordingly.

The negotiation also addressed two other important issues: first, from time-to-time, non-

VASSAR SAR members from other state societies request to participate in a VASSAR CG musket firings. However, the VASSAR insurance coverage does not extend to non-VASSAR members, such as private citizens, DAR, CAR, or non-VASSAR re-enactors. One option is to decline any offers to participate (due to zero coverage), or request the non-VASSAR member to present to the VASSAR CG Commander, a written and valid Certificate of Insurance (COI) from an insurance company confirming their coverage extends to the specific member(s) and scheduled event within 48 hours prior to an event.

The second and even larger issue related to the policy exclusion called the Explosives Exclusion, for which many insurance companies assume a very broad interpretation. The standard exclusion applies to the distribution... sales... or use of explosives or explosive devices. Obviously, the key question is whether this exclusion applies to the handling and discharge of black powder explosives? Our insurance company confirmed their narrow interpretation: namely that the exclusion does not apply to black powder firings of blank cartridges by muskets or rifles. The insurance company stated in writing that the Explosives Exclusion is intended to apply to the use of fireworks, TNT or C-4.

From an administrative standpoint, Lockton is structured to service their accounts on a real-time basis. Any requests for VASSAR to provide a host event sponsor a Certificate of Insurance (COI) evidencing VASSAR insurance coverage, must be submitted to Lockton within 3 business days prior to the sponsored event. Also, Lockton provides a 1-888 claims reporting number for real-time claims/incident notification to Lockton. The Lockton claims numbers supports and compliments the VASSAR Accident Report Form currently available to all VASSAR CG members and chapters.

As Lockton quickly realized during their review of our application, VASSAR is fully com-

mitted to loss control, whereby we seek to reduce both the frequency and severity of injury or property type losses.

Our risk management protocol includes regularly scheduled in-person CG workshops stressing practices and procedures to ensure that safety is first and always. Color Guard training is supplemented by safety and training videos available to CG commanders posted on our SAR website, our SAR Facebook page and YouTube. The safety of VASSAR color guardsmen, participants and guests at CG public events is paramount.

VASSAR has always been committed to a safety-centric culture from the bottom to the top with the Color Guard. Our North Region Color Guard Commander also serves as the National Society Color Guard Safety Officer and has received the full support from our National and Virginia Color Guard Commanders.

We will continue our commitment to loss control programs within our chapters to enhance our risk management protocol of minimizing risks. We will also seek more favorable insurance coverage terms during our coverage renewal scheduled in June. For now, Lockton has demonstrated itself to be a supportive partner and risk advisor to our insurance needs and the VASSAR mission.

The Battle

Following an American victory at the Battle of Cowpens in South Carolina in January 1781, General Nathanael Greene's southern army outran British forces under Lord Cornwallis as both armies raced northward across the Carolinas, toward the Dan River in what became known as the Race to the Dan. Greene's army crossed the Dan River to safety near South Boston. Having successfully outmaneuvered General Lord Cornwallis and reached the banks of the Dan River, he crossed into Halifax County, General Greene and his troops moved northward and crossed the Banister River near present-day Halifax. The Crossing of the Dan by General Greene left General Lord Cornwallis and his troops stranded on the southern banks, The crossing has come to be considered by historians as a major turning point in the American Revolution.

According to Dr. Larry Aaron, author of "The Race to the Dan-The Retreat that Rescued the American Revolution, patriots had marched 200 miles from Guilford Courthouse, North

Carolina to the Dan River in Virginia, braving the harshest of winter conditions—the last 40 miles having been done in 16 hours. "Every half-clad, starving, frostbitten soldier who made it to the Dan that day was a hero. Subordinate officers served with distinction, but Major General Nathanael Greene was the man of the hour. He enjoyed high praise from friend and foe. George Washington wrote to Greene, 'You may be assured that your retreat before Lord Cornwallis is highly applauded by all ranks, and it reflects much upon your military abilities.'" (p.33).

Once the Dan River, near present-day South Boston, was crossed on Feb. 14, 1781, General Nathanael Greene and the Southern Army proceeded northward to the Banister River. Cross-

ing there, they marched to Halifax County Courthouse, north of the Banister River. Camping there for a period of time, Greene corresponded with other American officers including Colonel Thaddeus Kosciusko and Colonel Henry "Light Horse Harry" Lee, asking for supplies and reinforcements.

On Feb. 15, 1781, while camped at Irwin's Ferry, Greene wrote a poignant report to General Washington that includes the following excerpt: "The miserable situation of the troops for want of clothing had rendered the march the most painful imaginable, several hundreds of the soldiers tracking the ground with their bloody feet...Our Army are in good spirits notwithstanding their suffering and excessive fatigue." (p.34).

In his memoirs, Light-Horse Harry Lee records, "The people of Halifax County received us with the affection of brothers mingled with the admiration of the brave devotion to country just exhibited....The army also enjoyed wholesome and abundant supplies of food in the rich and friendly county of Halifax. Neighboring Pittsylvania sent aid as well. Help came from all over Southside Virginia. Militia units poured in, and also fresh continental troops arrived." (p.34).

The Present

The Crossing of the Dan became a turning point in the American Revolution, precipitating events that led to the British surrender at Yorktown. Because of its historical significance the National Society Sons of the American Revolution has now recognized the Crossing of the Dan as a nationally sanctioned event. The Crossing of the Dan Commemoration began

in 2005 with members of the Virginia, North Carolina, Georgia SAR, Virginia Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) and the Halifax County Historical Society.

Since 2005, the support of the commemoration has continued to grow. The sponsor-ship of the event now includes the Dan River Chapter SAR, the Virginia SAR (VASSAR), the Berryman Green DAR Chapter, the Halifax County Historical Society, the South Boston – Halifax County Museum, the town of South Boston, the town of Halifax and the county of Halifax.

The event also has been recognized by a Joint Resolution of the House and Senate of the Virginia Legislature.

The Weekend Activities

This year's Crossing Events will get underway on Thursday, Feb. 9, 2023. The South Boston-Halifax County Museum of Fine Arts and History will kick off a weekend of Crossing of the Dan festivities beginning at 7 p.m. with a historical program by guest speaker Cody Youngblood entitled "Fitting An Army".

Mr. Youngblood, curator of Red Hill - Patrick Henry's Home, presenting a historical program about the patriots of Halifax County and their role in resupplying General Nathanael Greene's army after the crossing. Youngblood's program will feature the Southern Continental Army Exhibit now on display at the museum as a complement to the Crossing of the Dan permanent exhibit. In addition to working as the curator at Patrick Henry's Red Hill, Youngblood is an architectural historian who holds a B. A. in Historic Preservation and Museum Studies from the University of Mary Washington and an M. A. in the Conservation of Historic Buildings from the University of York. He formerly served as the Museum Director of George C. Marshall's Dodona Manor and the Collec-

tions Manager at Oatlands Historic House & Gardens in Leesburg.

At Red Hill, Youngblood stewards the largest collection of Patrick Henry artifacts in the world and oversees the preservation of the site's historic built environment.

The public is invited to attend Youngblood's presentation and to tour The Crossing of the Dan permanent exhibit at the museum located at 1540 Wilborn Avenue in South Boston.

On Saturday, Feb. 11, at The Prizery, beginning at 10 a.m. for the 242nd anniversary commemoration of the Crossing of the Dan. Award-winning multi-instrumentalist, singer-songwriter and master performance artist David Russell will present "Music Of The Revolutionary War Period"

Born to a musical family, Russell began the study of classical guitar with a Segovia Master at age 6 and soon broadened his musical interests to include many different styles of acoustic guitar as well as other instruments.

Over the last 38 years, he has performed throughout the U.S. and Canada. Aside from his number one instrument of guitar, he is a multi-instrumentalist performing on mandolin, octave mandolin/bouzouki, banjo and Dobro.

Parallel with his work career as a touring contemporary music performer and recording session artist, Russell holds several shows a year presenting American historical music. He emphasizes music that was performed to small audiences around a

campfire or the intimacy of a home parlor when there were no recordings and music was carried in memory by oral tradition of live performance. He has a deep interest in bringing colonial history alive through period music and songs.
