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National Society of the Children of the American Revolution

The National Society of the Children of the American Revolution (N.S.C.A.R.) is the nation's oldest, largest, patriotic youth organization and offers membership to anyone under the age of twenty two, lineally descended from someone who rendered material aid to the cause of American Independence as a soldier, sailor, civil officer, or recognized patriot in one of the several Colonies or States, or of the United States. N.S.C.A.R. activities focus on patriotism, service, and education about our American heritage.

Membership Eligibility

"Any boy or girl under the age of twenty-two is eligible for membership in the National Society of the Children of the American Revolution who is lineally descended from a man or woman who, with unfailing loyalty, rendered material aid to the cause of American Independence as a soldier, sailor, civil officer, or recognized patriot in one of the several Colonies or States, or of the United States, provided that the applicant is personally acceptable to the Society." (Article III, N.S.C.A.R. Bylaws)

Joining C.A.R. requires an application to document bloodline descent from a documented Patriot

meeting the above criteria. Local Society membership is the encouraged way to be involved with C.A.R. This means possibly registering young relatives where they live instead of in a society close to you. There is a Society Lookup available on www.nscar.org/join

SAR dual membership is a special opportunity for young men. If applying to SAR from active C.A.R. membership (on the same ancestor), the application fee is waived with a "Certificate Attesting Membership" from the C.A.R National Headquarters.

Things to Know: Graphics and Punctuation

Written and Spoken Acronym: C.A.R. is written with periods and in the spoken word, each letter is stated ("C" "A" "R"). The Virginia Society, C.A.R. is styled as "V.S.C.A.R." Similar to SAR State Societies and local Chapters, C.A.R. has state and local "societies."

Graphics:

Per C.A.R. Guidelines, the C.A.R. Insignia and Logo have specific uses. The C.A.R. Insignia requires official purposes such as conference programs and grave markers, where the Logo can be used in more casual and branding settings. If the Insignia is used for a program, it is supposed to be at the top left or top center of the printed page. Since this is the same placement requirement as the DAR Insignia, we strongly suggest using the DAR and C.A.R. Logos if you are using a combination of graphics for a program.

The N.S.C.A.R. Logo must retain the tagline at the bottom of the graphic unless authorized by the N.S.C.A.R. Senior National Board of Management.







HISTORY of N.S.C.A.R.

Founding of the National Society

Harriett M. Lothrop (1844–1924), NSDAR member and well-known author, founded the N.S.C.A.R. in 1895 to instill patriotic values in the youth of America. During the 1895 NSDAR Continental Congress Mrs. Lothrop delivered a moving speech to its members urging them to join her in helping create a patriotic organization for their children. Mrs. Lothrop's vision was well received, and the Children of the American Revolution was founded on April 5, 1895. Below, you will find excerpts of her speech to the Daughters.

"I think you will agree with me that the hope of this country is with her youth. All of us now convened in a few years will pass from the scene; those to follow us will be the ones who are now in their formative state under our guidance. Into their hands will be laid the important trusts, the weighty responsibilities, the affairs of government, the whole executive and moral forces that make or mar the country. Tremen-

dous questions of moral, civil, and religious nature are to arise in the not distant future. Already some of them are overwhelming us. Face to face we as a nation are to be brought to issues, vital not alone in this country, but the whole world. America as a nation is yet in her infancy. It doth not yet appear what she is to become among the nations of earth. Certainly no one who reads the signs of the times can doubt that God has designed a mighty work to be achieved by her. Into her vast territories have been and are now pouring millions who "seek the home of the free." Evangelizing America means evangelizing the world. American institutions and principles means evangelization. Civil and religious liberty, built on the eternal principles of truth, honesty, and tolerance, means a God-fearing and God-loving nation."

"What a tremendous thought that some of our boys and girls may be growing up in our very midst with no adequate idea of what it is to be an American youth, claiming a heritage of these American principles. Can we as American women rest a moment while the impressible period is swiftly passing on with them?...."

"I would also advise most strongly the forming of historical societies, especially for young people, who should have their own society of this kind adapted to their age...."

"I would even say that the time is propitious for us convening here to form a young people's society to be called Children of the American Revolution...."



2023-2024 State Theme & State Project

2023-2024 State Theme: "France: America's First Wingman"

The French played a critical role in the American Revolution, offering their military support starting in 1778 and culminating in the Victory at Yorktown. Figures like the Comte de Rochambeau, Marquis de Lafayette, and the Comte de Grasse fought side-by-side with American patriots. French and American troops marched together on what is now known as the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route, which stretches 670 miles from Rhode Island to Yorktown, Virginia. Today, this historic road runs through forests, along modern highways, and even through private property.

A key French patriot was the Marquis de Lafayette — only 19 years old at the time he joined the American Revolution. Fifty years later, as the last surviving major general of the Revolutionary War, Lafayette returned and toured all of the 24 states in the United States from July 1824 to September 1825. He was received with a hero's welcome, and many honors and monuments were presented to commemorate and memorialize the visit.



In 2002, I stepped into a Virginia C.A.R. State Conference knowing little more than I was an extra set of hands for my (then) girlfriend's State Conference. What I found was a group of young people that encouraged and supported each other, having fun and making friends from across the state.



In the ensuing twenty years, I learned that C.A.R. activities are specially curated to encourage interactions, develop leadership skills, and teach members about history while having FUN. Minute" update during

Training Tomorrow's Leaders in Virginia

Virginia Society Children of the American Revolution (V.S.C.A.R.)'s SAR Liaison Committee

The VASSAR SAR-C.A.R. Liaison Committee has existed for many years as a single member committee. We look forward to building a State C.A.R. Liaison Committee that will establish C.A.R. points of contact in most SAR Chapters in the State of Virginia. The activities of this committee and the Virginia SAR members may change after the initial build. We will include the C.A.R. State President's project and assist in a fundraising schedule to increase contact between the President and SAR Chapters.

GOALS:

- Each VASSAR Chapter needs a C.A.R. Liaison who will be responsible for <u>all things C.A.R.</u> for the Chapter. These children are our future leaders and we need to nurture them properly. Invite the State President and invite him or her to provide information on the V.S.C.A.R. State Project.
- We know not all chapters have available C.A.R. Societies. We'll aim for
 70% participation (21 of 30 chapters) first.
- Create a budget line in your Chapter Budget called "Support of the C.A.R. State President's Project." Starting suggestion is \$250, but any amount is appreciated! Many Chapters "pass the hat" or buy project pins which increases the contribution.
- Have the local C.A.R. Society provide National Program and Project overview.
- Have the Chapter C.A.R. Liaison brainstorm ideas with the State C.A.R.
 Liaison to involve C.A.R. age-appropriate activities such as access to SAR youth contests, and programs such as Flag and Patriot Chests.

Why should my SAR Chapter work with the C.A.R.? Here are some talking points:

- Supporting/Sponsoring C.A.R. earns credit on the SAR Americanism Report
- SAR receives young members who are trained and able to lead
- Priceless time spent with children and grandchildren who actively participate
- We can build character... which looks like:
 - ♦ Honesty, compassion, self-discipline, good judgment respect for others
 - ♦ Courage, Responsible Citizenship and Patriotism
 - ♦ A "How can I be of service" attitude
 - ♦ Setting high standards and clear expectations

We, The SAR Liaison Committee appreciate the opportunity the *SAR Bulletin* has given to SAR/C.A.R. Relations. Our initial objectives are below and will be followed in subsequent editions of the Bulletin numbers of Chapters and C.A.R. Societies placed in Liaison with each other.

Objectives and Activities

<u>Establish and maintain</u> a communications avenue with the Member and Senior Society President, Member and Senior State Board and VASSAR.

<u>Communicate the Themes and Project</u> of the State and National Presidents' Projects and Programs to VASSAR members and ensure the State follows through on its mone-

tary commitments. This Committee provides input to the National Liaison Committee in support of their financial commitments and total program support for both the State and National Programs/Projects. The Committee will be built by August 1st, and will start with semi-annual meetings to adjust priorities if necessary.

The SAR-C.A.R. State Liaison will stimulate educational programs such as our Flag Program, Culture Chest of Colonial Living, Constitution Day program, and encourage participation in age-appropriate programs to all Chapters and linked C.A.R. Societies to present and opportunity for C.A.R. members to participate in SAR youth contests. Additional recognitions for participation, such as C.A.R. Medals of Appreciation, Color Guard, and Patriot Grave Marking Medals are available for presentation to C.A.R. Members.

- Establish a Chapter SAR Liaison with 70%, 21 Chapters, in Virginia by Mid-Year.
- Establish a Member Clicks Chapter Liaison Group contact list. Chapters, please provide contact info (name, address, email, and telephone number) of a Chapter Liaison and (if applicable) the name of the local C.A.R. society (or societies) you currently support. The Chapter Liaison will be the POC in Member Clicks for interactions with the local C.A.R. Societies and the State Liaison will be the backup for the Local Liaison.
- ♦ Establish communication and planning strategy with respect to local C.A.R. Societies for fundraising and activity support, including the President's Project and

programs.

- ♦ Encourage dual membership for C.A.R. members who are eligible for SAR.
- ♦ <u>Establish a SAR/DAR/C.A.R. state committee</u> connection to transfer ideas, new programs/projects through member clicks to the local Chapters and local Societies.



C.A.R. State Projects turn over with administration changes in April at the C.A.R. National Convention. VASSAR Compatriot Will Elston of the George Washington Chapter is completing his tour as the Virginia C.A.R. State President. His 2022-2023 State Project was to build a partnership with the National Park Service's Colonial National Historic Park to present a new introductory film on-line and at the Yorktown Battlefield Visitor Center and to support the Historic Weapons Demonstration Program at the Yorktown Battlefield.







Just as the legendary King Arthur's Camelot depended on the support of the famous and not-so-famous knights of the Round Table, the success of the American Revolution depended on thousands of lesser-known Patriots who supported and served alongside famous generals like Washington, Lafayette, or Nelson. Their support led to the Victory at Yorktown. After Yorktown, the last major battle of the American Revolution, the British government was demoralized and no longer had sufficient public support to continue the war, and peace negotiations began between Great Britain and the United States. Thus the Victory of Yorktown fulfilled the promise of the Declaration of Independence, and the new nation's actual independence began. This year, the Virginia C.A.R. will celebrate some of the lesser-known Patriots without whom the victory at Yorktown would not have been possible. Each month, a new "Patriot of the Round Table" will be revealed and take his or her seat at the Virginia C.A.R. Round Table. Local Societies are encouraged to use the information about the Patriot revealed each month at meetings that occur during that Patriot's month.

C.A.R.: Training Good Citizens & Developing Leaders

What do you know about C.A.R.? I don't mean the 125+ years of organization history, but have you heard about what C.A.R. is doing **today** in communities across the country? C.A.R. Members actively participate in service projects, educational activities, and patriotic programs. The annual programs are developed BY members FOR members with senior leader mentoring at all levels of the organization.

Last Spring, we held a webinar with (now Honorary) National President Liza Fridemaker, Senior National President Lori Walters, several National Officers, and many members of the SAR-C.A.R. Liaison committee. This summer, current National President Jacob Shadinger presented his project and his hopes for closer ties with the SAR Congress attendees in Renton, WA. On a national level, SAR "gets it" and hears the C.A.R.'s request for senior leader-

ship assistance.

At a state level, I receive many C.A.R. Activity Reports that demonstrate strong coordination of activities between SAR Chapters and C.A.R. Societies. For most states, greetings are exchanged at state conference banquets and (very appreciated) financial support is given to C.A.R. State projects. I appreciate seeing these formal exchanges, but there's so much more value in leading by example. State Presidents, please consider engaging C.A.R. members in your state initiatives/projects and color guards.

C.A.R.: Training Good Citizens & Developing Leaders

The local level is where I see the best engagement between C.A.R. and SAR. Many families attend C.A.R. and SAR and DAR activities together, making this a fantastic way to share ideas between our organizations. Member engagement is one of the best keys to retention - for C.A.R. AND SAR! Use local events to give C.A.R. members a reason to participate, and encourage them to lay a wreath or render honors at a grave marking.

Don't just take my word for it! SAR members who have worked with C.A.R. members for many years provide the following insights:

"C.A.R. members are ready for SAR leadership positions. They are good citizens who understand the responsibility of leadeship."

"C.A.R. is one of the best training grounds for active professionals. These members know how to run meetings, keep enthusiasm high, and plan successful events."

"You want a great representative for the next generation of SAR? Talk to the young men of the C.A.R. who will be strong SAR leaders in the future!"

WHAT CAN I DO?

How can any SAR Member support the C.A.R.?

- 1) Enroll your children and grandchildren (and nieces and nephews) in C.A.R! Grandsons can be dual members of C.A.R. and SAR until age 22. There is much benefit in dual membership, since C.A.R. members work regularly with their peers in C.A.R. and can bring that leadership experience into SAR and DAR. If the prospective members are not living near you, we encourage you to enroll them near their home so they can be active members in a local society. If this is not an option, we've learned that many C.A.R. societies hold Zoom meetings, so remote participation may also be possible. Use the "Find A Society" link to locate a local society at www.nscar.org/join
- 2) Offer your expertise to C.A.R. Could you share your military career to inspire youth? Do you enjoy teaching? What about sharing your experience with patriot grave markings and helping a C.A.R. society to place a C.A.R. grave marker? C.A.R. is always looking for leadership and logistical support and SAR can provide those in great quantity! If your chapter doesn't sponsor a C.A.R. society, consider offering your assistance at the State or National level.
- 3) Provide financial support. You can support the C.A.R. financially through a one-time or recurring donation, legacy gift, or becoming a Star Supporter of the C.A.R. One-time donations may be provided at www.nscar.org/donate. Star Supporter (recurring) donations require a login to National C.A.R. website at www.nscar.org. Create an account and then look for "Ways To Give" in the Authorized Users' section.

WHAT CAN I DO?

- 4) Get involved. C.A.R. societies are always looking for senior leadership. A new activity that SAR can support is the N.S.C.A.R. Day of Service event. The N.S.C.A.R. Day of Service is an annual event held on/near April 5 to honor the founding of the C.A.R. Contact your C.A.R. State President and Senior State President to ask how you can support this service project or get information to promote coordination with your State Societies and Local Chapters.
- 5) Chapter Presidents: Invite your local society to chapter meetings at least three times per year so they can update you on activities. Include an option for a Virginia C.A.R. State Officer to attend and provide an update on the State Project and National activities! Have the society members provide "greetings," an update on their latest society meetings or other C.A.R. activities and projects.

C.A.R. Medals

C.A.R. is training the leaders of tomorrow, leaders that are eligible to become tomorrow's members of the SAR and DAR. SAR can secure its own future by helping to develop strong, well-rounded citizens. You can encourage members of your chapter and state to get involved and support the C.A.R. For those that are already involved with C.A.R., you can honor and recognize their service using one of the SAR-C.A.R. Medals of Appreciation.

The SAR-C.A.R. Medals of Appreciation

It was created to improve camaraderie and support between our organizations. The medal comes in three levels: bronze, silver, and gold. In summary, these medals can be awarded to members and senior members of the C.A.R. as well as to SAR members in recognition of outstanding services rendered to a local, state, or national society of the C.A.R.

Bronze – The bronze medal recognizes C.A.R. members who have significantly aided SAR programs such as grave markings, flag retirements, cemetery cleanups, or any other program that promotes coordination and collaboration between the SAR and C.A.R. In addition, SAR can honor members and C.A.R. senior leaders who have supported or served a local C.A.R. society, as well as SAR members that assist and promote SAR membership for C.A.R. members that qualify for SAR membership. Really, any work with the C.A.R. for the mutual benefit of our organizations qualifies for the bronze level medal. This medal can be given by any State Society or local chapter.

C.A.R. Medals of Appreciation

Silver – The silver medal also recognizes C.A.R. members, C.A.R. senior leaders, and SAR members for liaison or collaborative activities, but like other silver level awards, this medal can only be given by a State Society for efforts that have significantly supported state-level efforts.

Gold – The gold medal is reserved by the National Society to recognize those that have promoted collaboration between the SAR and C.A.R. at the national level. If you have someone that you would like to be considered for the Gold SAR-C.A.R. Medal of Appreciation, contact the C.A.R. Liaison Committee chairman about submitting a recommendation.



A SAR CHAPTER HELPING A CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION SOCIETY

On 12 February 2022, the Sgt Maj John Champe Chapter (SMJC) Virginia SAR was rechartered to serve primarily Loudoun County. With a National SAR goal to assist and sponsor local Societies of Children of the American Revolution, our chapter began looking for a C.A.R. Society in Loudoun County. On 6 February 2022, the Reverend John Marks Society (RJMS) C.A.R held their initial meeting of senior leaders to revitalize the Society. SMJC and the RJMS C.A.R had revitalization in common.

The RJMS C.A.R serves primarily Loudoun County. Fairfax Resolves Chapter and four local DAR Chapters stepped in to support the society in its first revitalizing year. The chapters offered many invitations and programs to support the RJMS C.A.R. and filled up the C.A.R. calendar with lots of fun activities.

My involvement with C.A.R did not start with RJMS C.A.R. I have four grand-children living in Northern Virginia. All four became members of the Colonel William Grayson Society (CWGS) C.A.R in 2017. Paula, grandmother of the four grandchildren, made colonial era dresses for three granddaughters and militia attire for Jacob. The grandchildren participated with us in multiple events in Northern Virginia sponsored by multiple SAR and DAR chapters. For example, the granddaughters participated in the commemoration of Patrick Henry at Historic St John's Church in Richmond and in a Greater Manassas Veterans parade.

Jacob's first event was a patriot grave marking in Alexandria in 2017 and he was in the color guard for the CWGS C.A.R marking of the graves of Colonel William Grayson and Chaplain Spence Grayson in Woodbridge, the very first Patriot grave marking with a C.A.R. marker for the CWGS C.A.R.

As the girls grew out of their Colonial dresses they elected to reduce attendance at events, while Jacob continued throughout the period 2017 through 2022. I produced articles and photos after each event to help the CWGS C.A.R. Senior Society President with the society newsletter content. I also made two program presentations to the CWGS C.A.R. Two events were special for our family.

First: On 15 October 2022, SMJC completed nearly one-year coordination with the Seven Hills Society C.A.R in Lynchburg for placement of a C.A.R Patriot marker for Captain Thomas Logwood, Jacob's 7 x great grandfather. The Seven Hills Society reached out to other C.A.R Societies in South Virginia with Seven Hills Society C.A.R. and the William Byrd Society C.A.R participating by presenting wreaths. Thirteen C.A.R. members conducted the ceremony during which they dedicated and unveiled the markers and provided appropriate prayers for the event. SMJC concurrently dedicated a SAR Patriot Marker.

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Second: The Patriot Grave Marking for Ezekiel Potts was held at the Old Potts Cemetery near Hillsboro. Jacob is Ezekiel 6x great grand Nephew and the cemetery was established by David Potts, Jacob's 7x great grandfather. Jacob dedicated a wreath, participated in the Color Guard and removed the shrouds from the marker.

Other recent C.A.R.-SAR events included the Commemoration of Sgt Maj John Champe at his homesite, three Junior Color Guard Workshops, (two co-sponsored by the Col. James Wood II (CJW-II) and SMJC Chapters SAR) and the RJMS C.A.R participated in nine 2022 events sponsored by SMJC or where SMJC participated.

Working together in 2022 paid dividends for end-of-year recognition and awards for both SMJC and the RJMS C.A.R For 2022 RJMS C.A.R won Virginia Society C.A.R "Most Improved Society," won the "Emerson Bowl" for most new members, and was recognized as the #3 Society in Virginia (Awarded the Gold Honor Roll Award). In addition, they won twelve Committee Contest Awards including Best Progam/First Place for C.A.R/DAR/ SAR/SR relations. SMJC was selected as 2022 Best Medium Sized Chapter for Virginia SAR and was presented the Chapter Excellence Award for all around performance. SAR selects these awards based on total points accrued in the SAR Americanism Report, part of which is C.A.R and DAR relations.







The 2023 District 6 was a very strong contest. The district had 116 student, 87 projects, 33 judges and a dozen volunteers from the Virginia SAR, Military Aviation Museum and VFW. All came together March 18th for the biggest District 6 contest yet! The Military Aviation Museum's staff was outstanding the Aircraft were just as impressive and wonderful to see up close.

The contest opened at 9am in the main museum near a model of the Wright flyer. I may be wrong but this year seemed to have more Dads in attendance.



As student arrived, got checked in and prepare for interviews, the registration desk got busy. Along with the volunteers we are very grateful for the teachers who encourage and supported the students who participated. We are very thankful for Dr. Wendy Scott's continued support of History Day and volunteering to help with registration.

After the Judging concluded at 1:30pm everyone was invited to view the student's exhibits in the Army hanger and well as the many historic aircraft.

After completing the interview Students and parents were able to tour the museum thanks to the complementary admission for tours provided by the Military Aviation Museum, this included tours of the Fighter Factory Hangers! Did I mention how totally awesome the Aviation's Museum people are?
