A grave marking ceremony for two Revolutionary War soldiers. Lt. William Harwar Parker VSN and Captain James McIlhany, Virginia Continental Line are buried in the McIlhany Family Cemetery in Loudoun County. John Lynch and I located the cemetery near Hillsboro and partnered with the Sgt Maj John Champe chapter to survey the badly neglected site. We requested and finally received permission from the landowner to perform some work to make the cemetery presentable for a ceremony.

Compatriot Barry Schwoerer and I spent a couple days working there a few weeks ago. We cut fallen trees, saplings, and grapevines. We removed briars, weeds, and undergrowth and raked out debris from the confines and perimeter. We restacked fallen stones from the fence. Basically, we did all the work within our senior capabilities. There were several large dead/dying trees and limbs that have been removed.

### Brenan Burke is our June speaker.



Brendan Burke is the State Underwater Archaeologist with the Virginia Department of Historic Resources. Originally from Virginia, Brendan received an MA from The College of William & Mary and served as Assistant Director for the Lighthouse Archaeological Maritime Program in St. Augustine Florida before repatriating to the Commonwealth and working for DHR. Today, he leads a team to locate, document, and preserve Virginia's submerged archaeological resources.

After the surrender of British forces at Yorktown in October of 1781 the American Revolution remained as an active war despite a cessation of fighting. A divided series of former colonies sorted themselves out into an emergent nation and communities were stalked by hostilities sparked from lingering political alliances. Several major convoys were assembled by the Royal Navy to evacuate American Loyalists, who saw themselves as patriots in their own sense. One such convoy met disaster during the winter of 1782 when sixteen vessels were lost trying to enter St. Augustine in British East Florida. Join Underwater Archaeologist Brendan Burke to discuss how this wreck links to a broader context of the post-Yorktown landscape of the American Revolution and the formation of the United States.





## "Book of the month"



Life in America, as the nation was being born, was rough and uncertain. In the most civilized cities, pigs roamed the streets freely; in it most pious pulpits, ministers preached with shotguns at their sides. Oscar and Lilian Handlin bring alive these crucial and exciting times. From Yankee farmers to southern yeomen, from New York merchants to frontier woodsmen, this is the story of how Americans ate, drank, loved, prayed, traveled, fought, and lived and died between 1770 and 1787. In the process of describing people's lives, the Handlin's offer a novel interpretation of the American Revolution. The Revolution, they believe, simply legitimized the violence already endemic in American in American society. The danger of death meant little to a people inured by a hard life to the use of force. This, is a much as patriotism and glory, enabled Americans to declare and win their independence.

A Restless People is a social history at its best: not just statistics or stories, it is a dramatic account of how the lives of common people changed the course of history and were in turn changed by that history.

An extract from a "Kirkus" magazine book review (Issue: Feb 1, 1982). "Even before the Revolution, the Handlin's contend, colonial Americans had become a new people with a new identity, forged "in the unremitting insecurity of freedom." On the one hand, circumstance and necessity had made them enterprising, innovative, pragmatic, violent, crude, individualistic, impatient, nomadic; on the other hand, the virtual collapse of traditional social rank and restraint had left them hungry for status, absurdly conscious of fashion, deeply sentimental about love and marriage and the family, anxious about their health, and fearful of the future.

Their chapters on country life, on childhood and families, and on the psychological burdens of constant vulnerability to misfortune and disease are in fact outstanding; and it is always important to be reminded that Revolutionary Americans had more on their minds than ideological abstractions and theories of government.

Stephen Lee was born on 03 Dec 1731 in Goochland County, Virginia, the son of John James Lee and Lucy Braxton.

At age thirteen, Stephen was listed on the tithables in Goochland County, Virginia as a tobacco farmer with his father, John. He moved with his family to Bedford County and later to Henry (now Franklin) County. Many tobacco farmers moved when the land played out and cheap land was offered further west.

Stephen married Ann Poore on 03 Nov 1763 in St. James Northam Parish, Goochland. Her Father Thomas is an SAR Patriot.

He was an active supporter of the Continental Army with goods and is listed as a Patriot for the American Revolution. About 1793 they moved from Virginia to Pulaski County, Kentucky,

USA. They were heavily involved with the Baptist Society and were charter members of the


White Oak Baptist Church, donating the land for the church building.

He passed away in December 1809 in Pulaski County, Kentucky, USA. He and his wife were buried at Lee Cemetery in Nancy, Pulaski County, Kentucky, USA.

# From the Chaplain Jim Morford



In just a few weeks we will celebrate our nation's 247<sup>th</sup> birthday. Parades may be occurring less frequently, but it is still a day for picnics and fireworks – even if many children (and not a few adults) don't know what it is we are celebrating. Some will begin the day's festivities by attending our Chapter's 38<sup>th</sup> Annual Service of Prayer and Thanksgiving at Bruton Parish Church.

It is on the day - July 4 - that our thoughts turn to the founding of our country and to the brave men and women who sacrificed to bequeath to us a free and independent nation.

We frequently hear that we were founded as a Christian nation. If that were precisely the case, we might today be a theocracy rather than a democratic republic.

The Pilgrims of Plymouth came to America to escape religious persecution. They broke from the Church of England to create their own separate church. The Puritans of Massachusetts Bay, unlike the Pilgrims, came to America to establish their own "pure" form of the Church of England. Christianity was very much at the core of their immigration.

Unlike the New Englanders, the settlers of colonies such as Virginia and New York came largely for commercial purposes. Though they may not have come for religious reasons, they brought their religion with them and established churches which they attended regularly, and which became the cultural centers of their settlements.

The distinguished Dr. David L. Holmes, Professor of Religious Studies, Emeritus at the College of William & Mary who passed away a few weeks ago on May 5, was a nationally recognized American church historian. One of his most notable works was, *The Faiths of the Founding Fathers*, in which he offers an instructive look at the spiritual beliefs of our founders.

According to Professor Holmes, Martha Washington, Samuel Adams, John Jay, Patrick Henry, and Thomas Jefferson's daughters are examples of those who held orthodox Christian views. On the other hand, influential figures, such as Benjamin Franklin, George Washington, John and Abigail Adams, Thomas Jefferson, James and Dolley Madison, and James Monroe, were believers of a different kind. They were respectful of Christianity, they admired the ethics of Jesus, and believed that religion could play a beneficial role in society but did not embrace the divinity of Christ. Some may have been agnostic, others were deists. No matter how their faith is defined, our nation's founders were in their way and in their day religious men and women. Their faith formed the backbone of society and helped define what it meant to be a citizen of the United States.

#### A Prayer for Our Nation

Heavenly Father, as we prepare to celebrate our nation's birthday, let us be ever mindful that it was with your guidance and inspiration that our founders acquired the courage and conviction to stand against all odds to win their independence.

Renew in us that same spirit. Give us the courage and the conviction to stand against all odds today in order to preserve our God given freedom and independence.

May Your light shine upon us as you continue to bless the United States of America. AMEN





## Flags of the American Revolution



3rd New York Regiment

Colors of the Third New York Regiment 1775
The 3rd New York Regiment was formed in 1775
from volunteers from the counties of Ulster,
Dutchess, Orange, and Suffolk under the
command of Colonel James Clinton for service in
Canada. The regiment would take part in the
Invasion of Canada, and later under the command
of Colonel Peter Gansevoort it took part in the
defeat of General Burgoyne in upper New York
State in 1777. The regiment was merged into the
lst New York Regiment in 1781. The flag has been
saved and is found in the Albany Institute of
History and Art. It is the only regimental flag of
New York that has been preserved to the present.
