# Williamsburg Chapter Virginia Society Sons of the American Revolution



By signing the Declaration of Independence, the fifty-six Americans pledged their lives, fortunes, and sacred honor. Nine died of wounds during the Revolutionary War, five were captured or imprisoned. Wives and children were jailed, mistreated, or left penniless. Twelve signer's houses were burned to the ground. No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

### HISTORY DAY

History Day is an academic competition for students in grades six through twelve. History Day is also an official Virginia SAR Society program. Chapters that do a good job in supporting History Day receive a streamer or a star for a streamer previously awarded for program excellence. History Day support is also considered in Best Chapter judging. This is why History Day participation is so important for our Chapter.

History Day competitions take place on three levels: District, State and National. Most SAR chapters throughout the Commonwealth participate on two levels: District and State. There are five ways in which a Chapter can show support for History Day.

FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS. Our chapters and

individual members can make financial contributions through checks made out in the name of National History Day.

JUDGING. History projects on the two school grade divisions and seven presentation categories need to be judged. Judges need to be knowledgeable of history in general.

SPECIAL AWARDS. Many chapters award bronze good citizenship medals to students who place first or second for a project in American History 1750-1800.

PROMOTION OF HISTORY DAY. Contacts in the schools are made through SAR Knight Essay Contest, the Runbaugh Oration Contest and Our Outstanding Students programs.

ATTENDANCE. Simply attending history fair, looking at the exhibits and encouraging the students is important. Our chapter belongs to District 6 which consists of Va. Beach, Chesapeake, Suffolk, Isle of Wight, Southampton, Sussex, Surry, James City, and York counties, plus Newport News/ Hampton/ Norfolk. District 6 will hold its competition on March 20, 2010, and the State Competition will be held in May at Thomas Nelson Community College here in Williamsburg. WE NEED JUDGES FOR BOTH OF THESE EVENTS!!! So, please give serious consideration to participation in one or both of these events.
