No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

"From the Historian's Bookshelf" selection for the month of August is a delightful little book entitled "Signing Their Lives Away: The Fame and Misfortune of the Men Who Signed The Declaration of Independence", by Denise Kiernan and Joseph D'Agnese, Quirk Books, Philadelphia, 2009.

The authors point out that "In the summer of

1776 fifty-six men risked their lives and livelihood to defy King George III and sign the Declaration of Independence--- yet how many of them do we actually remember? "Signing Their Lives Away" introduces the readers to the eclectic group of statesmen, soldiers, slave holders and scoundrels who signed this historic document---and the many strange fates that awaited them....Complete with portraits of the signers as well as a facsimile of the Declaration of Independence, "Signing Their Lives Away" provides an entertaining and enlightening narrative for history buffs.

Here is a sample of information from the book that you may not know. Who was the actual designer of the U.S. flag? Contrary to popular belief is wasn't Betsy Ross, as we were all taught in elementary school. The actual designer was Francis Hopkinson, one of the five signers from New Jersey! This, and many other interesting facts and mythbusters, makes this book both enjoyable and informative reading.
