By signing the Declaration of Independence, the fifty-six Americans pledged their lives, fortunes, and sacred honor. Nine died of wounds during the Revolutionary War, five were captured or imprisoned. Wives and children were jailed, mistreated, or left penniless. Twelve signer's houses were burned to the ground. No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

Historian's Corner

For a bit of light reading on these hot summer days, I am reading a whimsical little book by Mary Miley Theobald with the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation entitled *Death by Petticoat: American History Myths Debunked*, Andrews McMeel Publishing, LLC, 2012.

Every day, stories from American history that are not true are repeated in museums and classrooms across the country. Some are outright fabrications; others contain a kernel of truth that has been embellished over the years. Mary Miley Theobald has uncovered the truth behind widely repeated mythsunderstandings in our history. Here is one example from Mary's book: "Myth #9: Nails were so expensive that people used them on their front doors to show off their wealth." According to blacksmiths and historians, the truth is the exact "opposite" of the myth. Setting aside the fact that nails were not that expensive, it was the shoddy, cheapest doors that had the most nails. Well made, more expensive doors show no nails at all.

Death by Petticoat is not only a light, fun book to read while on vacation, it is also very informative. I heartily recommend it for your summer time reading enjoyment. Keep cool!
