

REGISTRAR'S CORNER

Here we are in Spring and SAR interest is blooming like flowers. I enjoy helping applicants prove their Revolutionary War ancestry and lineage. The job is timeconsuming though. I cannot continue to do it forever. I have learned a good deal about genealogy resources, so if you have been thinking about joining SAR or adding a supplemental ancestor sooner or later, I strongly recommend sooner. It is free and easy to check the DAR website http://services.dar.org/public/dar_research /Search/ to see if others have used your ancestor for DAR membership. Now you can do almost the same thing on the SAR website (sarpatriots.sar.org). A record copy (\$10) of someone who used your ancestor to join SAR is useful, if only to prove qualifying service.

And don't forget that there is such a thing as a Memorial Application, which can be submitted for a male who is a deceased close relative (within two generations) of an SAR member and whose application is based on (most of) the same lineage as that SAR member. The fees are reduced, there are no dues and it is a lasting tribute to a deceased father, brother or grandfather who thought about joining SAR, but never got around to it. Don't let that be you.

Biography of Patriot Simon Riegel Name of Patriot: Simon Riegel NSSAR Patriot # P-279147 Submitted by: Larry A. Divins

National Number: 191883 Simon Riegel/Riegle/Rigle was the first born son of Johannes Riegel Jr. and also the first born of this family in America. Simon was born on 5 November 1738 at Tulpehocken Twp., Berks County, Pennsylvania of German Rhineland-Palatinate immigrants Johannes Riegel Jr. and his wife Catarina Schirmann, who arrived in Philadelphia 18 September 1733 on Ship Pennsylvania Merchant with his father Johannes Sr. and his mother Catherine Echiman. Simon was a farmer and blacksmith in Berks County for his entire life. He married Anna Gertrude Kirschner in 1764 at Host Church in Tulpehocken Twp. and they raised 14 children together. Many of their children were pioneers in mid-western states. Simon died 12 Jan 1829 at the age of 90 and Anna reportedly also died in 1829 at the age of 84. Simon is believed to be buried in a private cemetery one mile west of St. Michael's Church in Tilden Twp., Berks

County.



Simon Riegel's full service as a private during the Revolutionary War is not known. He received Pennsylvania Depreciation Pay Certificate No. 17575, issued 17 Dec. 1790 in the amount of £9.17.0, which was only given to soldiers who had Continental Line service between 1777 and 1780 and remained in service in 1781. The pay rate for Berks County privates was £2.10 per month; hence, the Depreciation Pay Certificate amount indicates Continental Line service of about four months or more. Records of Berks County militia service on the Continental Line are substantially incomplete. It is known that several companies of Berks County militia had active service generally of 60 days duration on the Continental Line. Simon was confirmed by pay roll to be a member of Lt. Jacob Rehrer's Detachment of the Second Battalion of Berks County Militia, which guarded Convention prisoners of war near Reading, Pennsylvania with duty of 62 days. Simon's father, Johannes Jr., was also a Patriot, having paid the supply tax in 1781.

Battle Breaks Out At Lexington

Meanwhile, after the British forces waited two hours for additional supplies at their ships, the British continued on their journey to Concord. At the town of Menotomy, Smith decided to send an advance force commanded by Major John Pitcairn to gain control of the bridges at Concord. Pitcairn was given six companies of light infantry while Smith sent a soldier to request reinforcements from Boston. Soon, Pitcairn's troops would arrive in Lexington and meet up with the first wave of colonial minutemen.

Following Revere's warning to the Patriots, Captain John Parker began assembling minutemen to meet the British. After rousing approximately 137 men, they waited for the British to arrive. However, because it had taken the British two hours to receive supplies earlier in the evening, the minutemen were way ahead of schedule. Parker requested that the minutemen retire to nearby taverns until further notice while sending a few scouts from Lexington to approximate the arrival of the British. Many of these scouts were not seen again due to British arrest. One scout, Thaddeus Bowman, did return; he had narrowly escaped arrest by British soldiers and Pitcairn's advance troop was only half a mile behind him. Captain Parker hastily assembled his minutemen again. When Pitcairn's forces and Parker's minutemen met, there were 77 minutemen prepared to fight nearly 250 British soldiers. A shot was fired; although it's not clear which side fired first. More shots ensued. After the fight came to a close, eight Americans were dead and ten were wounded. This is in comparison to one wounded British soldier and several bullet wounds in Pitcairn's horse.

Mike graduated from Notre Dame with a degree in Government, and he earned his JD degree at the National Law Center of George Washington University.

Since retiring and moving here to Williamsburg, Mike has begun a second career as an amateur constitutional historian. Resuming his life-long interest in our Constitution and the men who created that remarkable document, he has developed and taught several well-received courses for adult learning programs such as the Christopher Wren Association in Williamsburg and the Lifelong Learning Society in Newport News. These courses include ones pertaining to: The Constitutional Convention of 1787, Ratification of the Constitution, The Bill of Rights, the Electoral College, and Fundamentals of the Constitution.

Mike's talk will be entitled: "Washington at Newburgh." A brief description of the talk is: "In the spring of 1783, George Washington made several critical decisions that cemented into our culture the principle that the military must be subordinate to our civilian authorities. This talk will examine how and why Washington made those decisions.







MAP AND DIRECTIONS TO OLD VICARS CEMETERY, RUSSELL COUNTY, VA FOR GRAVE MARKING CEREMONY, SATURDAY, APRIL 7, 2018, 2:00 PM



Driving Directions to Vicars Cemetery Highway 71, Russell County, VA from I-81

I-81, Abingdon, VA Route - For travelers driving from Abingdon from I-81. Take US Hwy 19/Alternate 58 North to traffic light at intersection of Alternate 58 and Hwy 19 North, approximately 15 miles. Make a left turn onto Alternate 58 at traffic light and drive past the Old Russell County Courthouse; turn left onto Hwy 71 South. Drive past intersection of Russell County Road 680 (on left). Old Vicars Cemetery is about 100 yds on the right. The area will be marked by balloons.

I-81/I-26, Kingsport, TN Route - For travelers going North on I-81 from Knoxville, Exit at I-26, Kingsport exit and proceed to Gate City, VA. Take Hwy 71 from Gate City North through Nickelsville, VA and continue. Watch for the Scott County line. The cemetery will be on a high grassy knoll to your left, 3 miles past the Scott County line. Russell County Road 680 will be past the cemetery on your right about 100 yards. If you arrive there, you have gone too far. Watch for the balloon markers.

Old Russell County Courthouse - You are invited to the Old Russell County Courthouse after the ceremony for light refreshments. Refreshments will be served in the old school room directly behind the courthouse, served and provided by The Tabitha Adams Russell Chapter, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. From the cemetery, continue on Hwy 71 to the intersection of Alternate 58. Take Alternate 58 toward Abingdon, VA and watch for the Old Russell County Courthouse sign. The distance is approximately 5 miles from the cemetery.

Note: You can GPS the Old Russell County Courthouse from Abingdon, VA and it is 21 miles.
