President James Monroe's actual birthdate will be celebrated on Sunday, April 28, 2019 at Hollywood Cemetery at 11 AM. The cemetery address is 412 S. Cherry St, Richmond VA, 23220 and signs will direct you to the Monroe gravesite.

To pay homage to the nation's leaders, wreath-laying ceremonies are held annually at the gravesite of each of the former presidents on their birthday. The Fort Lee Color Guard and US Army band will be present along with Monroe family members and state and local dignitaries. Following this annual tribute, the James Monroe Foundation will be hosting a separate wreath laying event in celebration of Monroe's 261st Birthday with a guest speaker and the support of many lineage societies, including the Sons of the American Revolution. Your chapter will participate in this wreath-laying event. SAR, DAR, CAR and other Societies and Chapters are invited to participate in a formal wreath laying ceremony at Martin's Station Monument, Wilderness Road State Park, Ewing, VA. This year the Raid is a VASSAR Presidential Initiative event. The ceremony begins at 10 am on Saturday, May 11th, 2019.

THE PENNSYLVANIA MILITIA IN 1777



Prior to 1777, Pennsylvania sent 12 battalions of volunteers to the Continental Army. Volunteers also formed 53 battalions of "Associators" who participated in the "Flying Camps" sent to New Jersey in the summer of 1776. Pennsylvania did not pass a comprehensive Militia Act until early 1777. Under the Act, all able bodied males between the ages of 18 and 53 were subject to active duty for two months service if called up. Government officials, Ministers of the Gospel and indentured servants were exempt, although others could avoid service by hiring a substitute or paying fines.

The Act provided for eight Battalion Districts in the City of Philadelphia and another eight in each of the eleven counties. The Battalions were set in geographic clusters to include 440 to 680 men. Implementation of the system was managed by County Lieutenants holding the rank of Colonel, but as a civilian and not a military officer.

The men in each Battalion elected their field officers, who were subject to three years duty. The county Colonels for each of the eight Battalion then drew lots to establish the rank order and number of the Battalions (1st, 2nd, etc.). Each Battalion was broken down into eight Companies commanded by a Captain. Men were assigned to the Companies based on geographic clusters and elected their officers. The men then drew lots to establish their "Class" ranking of one to eight, which would be the order in which they would be called up if needed. This system established the "Permanent Billet Rolls." These records, or "Returns," list the Battalion, Company and names of privates with their Class assignments, and are generally found in the "Pennsylvania Archives," Series 5.

As explained below, these are generally the records used for SAR applications for Pennsylvania Militia Patriots.

When call ups began, they would start with Class 1, which also became the active duty Battalion No. 1 for each county. For example, if Northampton County Class I were called, all the Class 1 privates in the county would be called and would be formed into active duty Battalion 1 commanded by the military Colonel who drew lot number one. Class 2, if called, would form into Battalion 2. and so on. Once a Class' two month active duty time would pass, the militia men would return home to their Permanent Billet Battalion/Company to await the their next call up. With its complexity, the militia system did ensure that any casualties would be spread throughout the counties. Note that the "Returns" of the active duty battalions generally listed the names of officers but only gave numbers of privates in the units. Therefore, the Permanent Billet Rolls become the primary document for identifying a Pennsylvania Patriot. Things happened fast. On April 5, within weeks of the Militia Act's passage, news reached British General Howe's Philadelphia of intention to march on the city. On April 10, Congress directed that 3000 militia be called to camp, and on April 25 all Class I's in the State were called to service. By the end of 1777, all eight classes of militia had been called to active service.

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REGISTRARS CORNER

I receive frequent inquiries about members submitting supplemental applications on additional ancestors. While chapter registrars do not sign off on these, NSSSAR requires that chapter registrars screen them before mailing to VASSAR. Supplementals have the same basic requirements as regular applications.

In most cases registrars give top priority to regular applications and devote many hours of research to generally assure that the application will pass the NSSAR standards. Supplementals responsibility for ensuring accuracy and conformance with standards rests on the applicant.

The NSSAR website includes an Application Preparation Manual. A member working on a supplemental should consult this before and during research on their additional ancestor. There are ground rules!

I can best compare it this way. Would you do your income tax without looking at the IRS rules and regulations? Flying blind into filling out an SAR application is similar to filing taxes without consulting instructions.
