# Virtual July 4 Service of Prayer & Thanksgiving to be Broadcast

Due to the limitations imposed by the governor and Episcopal Bishop, Williamsburg Chapter SAR's Thirty Fifth Annual Service of Prayer and Thanksgiving will not be open to seating in Bruton Parish Church. Rather it will be broadcast on YouTube at 10:00 am on July 4.

We are grateful for the cooperation of the clergy and staff of Bruton Parish Church for their assistance in preparing for this year's Independence Day service.

With only about half a dozen participants present including several Chapter members, present in the church to pre-record the service we will be carefully adhering to COVID-19 prevention guidelines.

The service will be the same as it has been for the past 34 years, but without a congregation present in the church. There will be music with organ and a soloist to lead hymn singing, prayers, scripture reading, a sermon to be delivered by the Reverend, Jan Brown, presentation of the flag, singing of the National Anthem, and the pledge of allegiance. Compatriots along with their families and friends are encouraged to join in the singing and pledge of allegiance while watching the service from home.

Here are preliminary instructions on accessing the service:

- 1. The service will be available only on YouTube, beginning at 10:00 am on July 4. It will remain accessible after that time as well.
- 2. The service will be available via Bruton's YouTube channel at <a href="https://www.youtube.com/user/BrutonParish">https://www.youtube.com/user/BrutonParish</a>. This will take you to the main Bruton YouTube page, though not directly to the July 4 service itself. You will need to identify which service you want to watch. (All of Bruton's services are listed in reverse chronological order, so if you login at (or just before) 10 am on July 4, the appropriate service will be at the top of the page.)

A service bulletin will also be available.

We will send out information on accessing the service bulletin and the service on or before July 3<sup>rd</sup>.

Plan now to join virtually with your fellow compatriots for our 35th Annual 4th of July Service of Prayer and Thanksgiving.









# Anthony Wayne UNITED STATES GENERAL

The owner of a tannery and extensive property in Pennsylvania, Wayne was commissioned a colonel in the Continental Army in January 1776. That spring his regiment was sent to reinforce the remnants of Benedict Arnold's Canadian expedition, which was retreating south after a disastrous campaign against Quebec. Wayne was then put in command of Fort Ticonderoga, New York. Promoted to the rank of brigadier general in early 1777, he played a prominent role that fall in the battles of Brandywine, Paoli, and Germantown, Pennsylvania. After spending the winter at the Valley Forge encampment, he led an attack on the British at the indecisive Battle of Monmouth, New Jersey, the following June.

In September 1780, when it was learned that Arnold had planned to betray West Point to the British, Wayne moved promptly to safeguard the fort. In 1781 he was sent south to assist the marquis de Lafayette. Gen. Wayne crossed the Potomac River and marched through Leesburg on June 3, 1781, On July 6 at Green Springs, Virginia he provided critical reinforcements that allowed the Continental army in Virginia to push Lord Cornwallis and the British army into Yorktown, where the war ended a few months later.

In 1794, President George Washington called upon Wayne to bring the ongoing violence with British-backed Indians in the Northwest Territory to a close. Wayne was victorious at the Battle of Fallen Timbers, near what is now Toledo, Ohio, and gained much of what would become Ohio and Indiana for the U.S. in the Treaty of Greenville.



# Virginia Society Sons of the American Revolution

## Passing of Virginia SAR Past President





Roderick Dew Brown, died peacefully at home in Bon Air on June 13, 2020. He was born in Pulaski, Virginia, on June 9, 1933, the son of the late William Horatio Brown and Ellen Byrd Dew Brown. He spent his formative years in Colorado and New Mexico before returning to Austinville, Virginia, where he received the rank of Eagle Scout in 1949. Mr. Brown married Mary Carter "Pat" Younger in Blacksburg on August 23, 1958. The couple settled in Richmond, Virginia.



Past President Brown traced his ancestors to Colonial America. Rod was a member of the Sons of the American Revolution where he served as president of the Richmond Chapter, Virginia State President (1980-81) and Vice President of the Mid-Atlantic States 1986-87). He was also a member of the Jamestowne Society and the Society of Colonial Wars where he served as Governor. He was formerly a member of the Sons of the Revolution.



But my concern is lineage, of men whose families can be traced back to the Revolutionary War years. Our chapter membership today totals more than 190 to include former government officials, veterans, NASA retirees, doctors, lawyers, plumbers; a cross-section of biographies of the every day American. And not surprisingly, most of those names also appear on the rosters of other volunteer community organizations supporting a galaxy of worthwhile programs and projects.


