On June 26, 2023, the Virginia Society, Sons of the American Revolution conducted ceremonies to commemorate the passing of Compatriot R. Wayne Rouse. He was the Virginia Society's State Secretary for over ten years. In addition to his role as Secretary, he was the State's Awards Committee Chair. Compatriot Rouse and his wife, Cheryl (known as Wink) were fixtures in the Virginia Society for a number of years. He was an inspirational leader who worked tirelessly to ensure the Virginia Society was amongst the leaders in the National





Society, Sons of the American Revolution. He was born October 6, 1942, in Washington, D.C., to Robert and Louise Rouse. He graduated from Suitland High School in Maryland and joined the United States Marine Corps in 1960, serving in the Reserves until 1968. Compatriot Rouse had a full career with the Potomac Electric Power Company, retiring in 1968, when he began his service as a volunteer firefighter at the Clinton, MD, Volunteer Fire Department and then La Plata, MD, Volunteer Fire Department, serving until 1978. He was a dedicated and well-decorated member of the Colonel Fielding Lewis Chapter of the Virginia Society in Fredericksburg, VA, serving as an officer and committee member. Compatriot Rouse was a member of the Freemasons. He joined the

Laurel Wreath Lodge 149 in Laurel, MD, and then Stafford Masonic Lodge 279 following his move to Virginia. After relocating to Atlanta, Georgia, in 2019, he joined the Sandy Springs Masonic Lodge 124. He was a member of the National Sojourners, Inc. with Fredericksburg Chapter 545 in Virginia and then Dobbins Chapter 434 in Marietta, GA. Rouse was outgoing, selfless and had the ability to make friends wherever he went.

To honor his memory, four events were held, beginning with a ceremony at the Regester Chapel United Methodist Church in Stafford, VA, where he had worshiped for years. This was presided over by Pastor Lyle Morton. The Virginia Society State Color Guard was led by Commander Chris Melhuish (*Jamestown Chapte*r) who was the escort for Wink Rouse throughout the day. At the church

services, State Color Guard Adjutant Dale *Corey (Colonel James Wood II Chapter)* presented an American Flag to honor the memory of a great compatriot and U. S. Marine Corps veteran. He was escorted by Sentinels William Schwetke *(Culpeper Minutemen Chapter)* and Ken Bonner *(Sgt Maj John Champe Chapter)*, leading a procession of close friends Lisa Prosser, Joe Rezash and NSSAR Chancellor General Michael Elston *(George Washington Chapter)*. They were followed by Wayne's son Paul carrying the urn with escort, NSSAR Vice President General, Mid-Atlantic District Colonel Peter Davenport, U.S. Army (Ret.) *(George Mason Chapter)* and Chris Melhuish escorting Wink Rouse to their positions of honor. Eulogies were presented by Prosser, Rezash and Elston, showing respect and adoration for the fallen compatriot. The service was attended by over 130 friends and family who showed up to pay their final respects. At the end of memorial service, a procession of the Virginia Society State Color Guard led the family and friends to a reception held to honor the memory of the compatriot.

Services then followed with a processional escorted by the Stafford County Sheriff's Department at the Old Andrew Chapel Cemetery a few miles away. A SAR Compatriot Grave Marking Ceremony was performed and led by State Secretary Tim Dioquino (*Fairfax Resolves Chapter*) to commemorate the passing of a brother compatriot. Virginia Society State President Ernie Coggins (*George Washington Chapter*) presented greetings and a brief presentation of the accom-





plishments of Compatriot Rouse. Additional Virginia Society State officers participating were First Vice President William Greaf (Williamsburg Chapter), State Chancellor Eric Monday, Esq. (Fincastle Resolutions Chapter) and National Trustee Jeff Thomas (Fairfax Resolves Chapter). During the ceremony, Coggins presented the widow with a pink rose and during the wreath presentation, individual red roses were presented to the urn by Davenport, Elston, Coggins, and Chapter Secretary John Carberry (Col Fielding Lewis Chapter). The Virginia Society State Color Guard Musket Squad then fired a three round salute followed by the playing of "Taps" by Chapter Past President Charles Jameson (Culpeper Min*utemen Chapter*). 2023 NSSAR Congress report for the Virginia SAR Trustee R. Bruce Meyer

Orlando Congress hosted by the Florida Society was an outstanding event. The Compatriots of Florida have much to be proud of. The 2023 congress was only my second time attending; my first was Sarvannah at both the only down side was the heat. I arrived Saturday evening, a little late for the reception but I did enjoy the SAR trivia game that evening in the hotel lounge. Although I missed the first round, the game was fun and it gave me a chance to meet some of the Compatriots attending congress.

Sunday started with a meeting of the Trustees, several things were announced. These included increasing the national dues, a new SAR educational outreach app for your mobile phones, new Social media guide, a Public relation guide and some hype for the upcoming Battle of Point Pleasant in October 2023. After the meeting finished several Committees held meetings until lunch.

The annual SAR memorial service was held at 2:00 p.m. located at St. Luke's United Methodists Church, several of the Virginia Delegation attended, I took a side trip to St. Cloud to see family. I did return in time to attend the Oration Contest, it was inspiring to see such bright students compete.





Monday morning started at 7am with the Council of State President breakfast, followed by 8am the Council of Youth Programs. The Compatriots of the Virginia Society were well represented with 18 delegates, of these several are committee members, chairs or officers of NSSAR.







Congress 1st session began at 9am with the National Color Guard presenting the colors followed by many greetings and introductions. Following these were reports of the committees, these can be found in the Congress Report Book, its 185 pages also can be found on the National SAR website, you must log in to view. During the lunch break many Virginia compatriots attended the Youth Awards lunch. The afternoon session of congress was a continuation of committee reports. Monday night the Compatriots of the Virginia Society got together for dinner at the Capital Grill near the hotel, always one of the most enjoyable unscheduled events but a Virginia tradition. Monday night was the induction of minuteman of 2023. After the ceremony the annual awards ceremony was held, Virginia had an outstanding year. A complete list will be published with the Bulletin. I am happy to report that the Virginia Society remains the best in the SAR!



Tuesday was another early start with the Middle Atlantic State breakfast. It is the time for campaigning by candidates for NSSAR officers. This year each postion had only one candidate, all gave a very short stump speech.





The Tuesday session started in earnest with a discussion of the executive committee's recommendation for a national dues increase of \$15.00. The explanation for the need was given and the case for an increase was very strong. Sighting increasing cost of operation due to inflation, combined with a decrease in the rate of the SAR growth. In the last three years the SAR has struggled to maintain our membership levels stubbornly hovering around thirty-three thousand. The delegates asked several questions respecting alternatives until the lunch break. After a break the session continued with debate concerning the due increase, one proposal to stretch out the increase over 3 years was found to be out of order because no congress can bind the future congress to increase the dues, each would need to take up an increase. After more deliberation the issue was passed with 2/3 approved (more like 90%). One change was to extend the current rates for life membership until August 1st 2023, after that date the cost of a life membership cost will reflect the increase.

The 2nd issue that generated debate was a recommendation for funding improvements to the office and workspace at the museum in Louisville. This was approved after some debate. Topping off the day, Senator Scott of Florida was inducted into the SAR. The session ended early; I can not recall exactly when but the 2023 -2024 NSSAR officers were elected by acclimation as none had an opponent.

The rest of the day I attend the Council of State President Meeting. The council was given presentations on the training developed for new compatriots, the most recent topic was NSSAR medal and awards. Another presented the new educational outreach app. This app can be found at the Apple app store and the android apps store. Several other offers in 2023. All of this information and more can be found in the congress report book.







The Banquet Tuesday night PG C. Bruce Picket presented several awards to Compatriots who have rendered service to the SAR in support of the PG goals. The evening program on the Colonial history of Florida was very educational. The dinner was good and the company of fellow compatriots from other states was enjoyable.

Wednesday was the final session of congress the Trustees were sworn in for 2024 more donations were announced. The congress received over 200k in donations to the Society's different funds. After the final session was completed the Trustees meeting was held. No new issues were brought up and the meeting was done in 15 minutes. That afternoon Compatriots attended the Last Naval Battle tour and commemoration. Also available were Family search presenta-





tion, organize a family event and the Youth Video Contest task force. The youth video contest is being trialed in several state societies. The program has no champion in Virginia, yet!

The final event was the Installation banquet Wednesday night. Outgoing PG Picket presented a few more awards. Dinner was served. After dinner President General John L. Todd took his oath of office, George Washington's ring was escorted and presented to PG Todd. Our New President General acceptance speech in which he set his priorities for 2023 -2024.

The National Congress ended on a very high note. Having attend last year and being at the spring and fall leadership it has been inspiring to see the National SAR is moving forward in educational outreach, online guidance, strong and even new youth programs, creating training for new compatriots and looking ahead to the achieving a national dues renewal system. Given the content produced in 2023 I am confident we will see improvement and growth in 2024.

Hundreds of SAR Compatriots, their wives, and many guests filled the ballroom at the Orlando Rozen Plaza Hotel to support this year's group of youth winners and be awed by their accomplishments. Each winner presented their entry with appropriate style. The National Orations Contest winner was one of six participants that competed at the oration finals on Sunday night. Having suitably impressed the judges, the winner presented a very eloquent speech at the lunch focused on <u>Deborah Sampson's</u> service to the Continental Army and how she was ultimately honorably discharged after the discovery that she was a woman. Patriot Sampson was the first woman to receive recognition for her service. What a way to pave the path for women in military service today!

The SAR ROTC winner was a young lady whose essay described her experience with the program and how the Code of Conduct served her well and helped her to make the right decisions. She said she was proud to have been able to rely on the Code and military values even in the face of personal cost to her. The winning essay from the SAR Eagle Scout Contest was a well written composition on the Battle of Camden

Lacking a music program, he took the opportunity to teach students some of the standard Americana songs that many of his students had not yet learned. He opened his presentation by inviting everyone to join him in a rendition of God Bless America. Other songs he incorporated into his classes included America the Beautiful, the National Anthem, and others.

As the National SAR-N.S.C.A.R. Liaison Committee Chairman, I must say that while the Youth Luncheon is always entertaining and educational in various ways, my primary function is to introduce our Children of the American Revolution guests and show SAR's support for this year's president's project. I'm happy to report that we had excellent representation from the C.A.R. this year as they took time off between their Regional Tour destinations (that is, their own nationwide publicity campaign) to support the SAR and its youth programs. DAR & SAR Relations



For more than a century, the members of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution have dedicated themselves to historical preservation, promotion of education, and encouragement of patriotic endeavor. These objectives should sound familiar as they align with the National Society Sons of the American Revolution dedication to promoting patriotism, preserving American history, and promoting education to our future generations.

In Virginia, the DAR and SAR have been working together for years promoting the shared objectives of our Societies. Whether through ties of friendship or family, members of our two societies have been marking grave sites, commemorating national and local milestone events, and educating young and old about the history of our country's founding.

The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, in July of 2022, established the DAR/SAR/S.R. Relations Committee to promote a congenial and harmonious working relationship with SAR and S.R. for the betterment of our shared objectives. The committee renders support and assistance in the area of





community-centered events and mutual membership growth and fosters shared goals of historic preservation, education and patriotism. Reporting extends to documenting the number of SAR/S.R. Medals of Distinction awarded and to whom, as well as the names of the medals.

Most recently the DAR has established The Hannah White Arnett Medal, for Distinguished Service to NSDAR, to recognize the many compatriots from the SAR and S.R. who serve alongside the DAR in Sparkling Service to America. There are three levels of recognition: chapter level (bronze), state level (silver), and national level (gold).

What is the VASSAR Color Guard?

Let's shed a little light on what it is. The VASSAR Color Guard (shorthand: "the Guard") is, in practice, not a discrete body of men assigned to the State Color Guard Commander. Instead, the Guard consists of two principal elements: first, a state color guard staff (i.e., the Color Guard Committee), which establishes promulgates, and monitors color guard policies and standards for all VASSAR color guard activities; and second, colonial-attired Compatriots assigned to VASSAR chapters who volunteer their time to participate in color guard related events sponsored/endorsed by our society. These events may be at the chapter, state, or national level. There are also public service events (think: outreach) where a non-SAR organization requests VASSAR color guard support. We participate in several of these. In 2022, VASSAR guardsmen supported over 127 in-

State and out-of-State events.

Put another way, if a chapter asks for VASSAR color guard support, it is essentially asking other chapters for assistance. Think of the difference between a Minuteman and a regular Continental soldier. One is on call and the other is assigned to a unit that can order him what to do, where to go, and when. We are more like Minutemen in this respect. The state color guard staff acts as a clearing house for color guard requests and employs a centralized schedule for guardsmen (and all Compatriots) to access and review. A point of clarification: the term "color guard" can be a little confusing in VASSAR. In the winter of 2021, we modified the old color guard model that saw a large number of flags carried by a color guard unit and we created a new (additional) group called the "Honor Guard," which is used at events where many flags are paraded. The premise for this modification is to keep the principal focus on the Colors (i.e., US, VA, and lead SAR flags), and to parade/display all other flags with the honor guard. In some respects, this streamlining places our color guards into a more traditional/conventional model. In addition to the color and honor guards, we also use a musket squad, where properly certified guardsmen handle and fire black powder, and we may also use sentinels. All these fall under the broad collective, "VASSAR Color Guard." Or the Guard, as noted earlier.

Today's Guard is advancing along many fronts.

Firstly, eighteen recruits joined the Guard in the first half of 2023, taking us to 135 guardsmen (as of the beginning of July). To our new members – welcome aboard.

Thanks to Compatriots Bruce Meyer, David Carpenter, and John Gullion, the transfer of web-based information from the previous system was flawlessly transferred to MemberClicks, and we now enjoy a professional web-based

source of VASSAR color guard information. [See: <u>https://www.virginiasar.org/</u> <u>the-color-guard</u>]

As you know, VASSAR was reorganized into four regions, and the color guard organization followed suit. Each VASSAR region has a Regional Color Guard Commander who reports directly to the State Color Guard Commander and Vice Commander/Adjutant. The Regional Color Guard Commanders have broad authority to execute policies and direction issued at the state level. (For chapter presidents, this is an important point to take note of – I encourage you to establish a working relationship with your respective Regional Color Guard Commander if you have not already done so.)

We have accomplished several significant milestones over the past year. These fall into three broad areas:

Standardized State-wide training

- Developed formal training standards involving the safe handling and firing of black powder.
- Revised the "VASSAR Color Guard Handbook," particularly its safety annexes.

• Supported the professional production of five color guard training videos for NSSAR use.

- Issued distinctive cockades and firelock safety wallet-sized cards to certified guardsmen.
- Expanded the number of training workshops for our guardsmen to attend.

Improved Insurance and Accident-Incident procedures

• We renegotiated a general liability insurance policy with a carrier that better suits our activities (i.e., Lockton Affinity).

• We developed and refined VASSAR Accident-Incident procedures for use by the ExCom and chapter presidents.

• Printed and issued Accident-Incident wallet-sized cards for all guardsmen (available for all chapter leadership).

- Established a VASSAR Media Liaison Team to respond to all media queries concerning any significant accidents or incidents at a VASSAR event. Contact information is posted on the VASSAR website, FB and Dispatch home pages.
- Opened State Color Guard Commander-to-Commander dialogues with adjacent states about liability insurance. In some cases, we have provided advice and assistance on how to obtain coverage. We have also exchanged Certificates of Insurance (COI), where available.

• For the first time, we integrated active-duty French military members into our color guards for special events. This unique arrangement will continue, and this international outreach is significant.



Review of 1776 by David McCullough

James R Poplar III is a retired Navy Commodore and 1st Vice President of the Fort Harrison Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution

Although published in 2005 by Pulitzer Prize-winning author David McCullough as we approach the 250th anniversary of our Republic perhaps it is time to read or re-read this seminal work that focuses on perhaps the most critical year - 1776 - in the birth of this then nascent nation.

The book is a companion to McCullough's earlier <u>biography</u> of <u>John Adams</u>, and focuses on the events surrounding the start of the <u>American Revolutionary</u> <u>War</u>. While revolving mostly around the leadership (and at times indecisiveness) of <u>George Washington</u> keeping mind that our first Commander-in-Chief never commanded and army, In addition, Congress was impatient and at times Washington had to literally beg for supplies and troops as he went up against the most powerful army at the time consistently primarily of professional Hessian soldiers.

At the onset, Washington often did not have a grasp of military strategy or tactics and had to be rescued often from his often-reckless plans by subordinates. McCullough bluntly terms him "indecisive and inept" as a battle commander but praises his perseverance and cleareyed recognition of his own and his army's faults.

Key Revolutionary War battles detailed in the book include the <u>Battle of Dor-</u> <u>chester Heights</u>, the <u>Battle of Long Island</u>, and the <u>Battle of Trenton</u>. The activities of the <u>Second Continental Congress</u> and the signing of the <u>Declaration of</u>

It really is a miracle that the Continental Army survived so many early debacles to fight another day. At several points, fog, and storms (perhaps by divine intervention) saved the rebels from imminent disaster. British generals, who often likened the war to a fox hunt, frequently failed to "bag" Washington and his army when they had the chance. The British also seriously misjudged the resolve of America's "rabble in arms." Typical was the general who crowed, "If a good bleeding can bring those Bible-faced Yankees to their senses, the fever of independency should soon abate."

McCullough's "1776" reminds us as always in America's wars that it is its citizen soldiers rather than "windy politicians" who have always paid the price of our freedom with their blood and sacrifice. One of the first to recognize this was Thomas Paine, whose famous words – "These are the times that try men's souls" - were inspired by the sight of Washington's frayed army in retreat, which against all odds triumphed over a superior foe.

Even if you have previously read "1776" it deserves attention as a constant reminder that our freedom came with a heavy price paid by those patriots who sacrificed it all for the nascent experiment of Democracy founded by these immortal words: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness."

The Americanism contest is basically a report to national of how we are meeting the objectives of the overall objectives of the society. At this time, let's discuss Tabs 1 and 2 of the Americanism Contest.

Tab 1 – Media

1A – Website. You are given 100 points for having a social media/ website that is owned by the SAR. If your chapter has one of these, then you get credit for it. The only stipulation is it must have been updated after 1 July of the contest year. For this year

that means 1 July 2023.

- 1B Advertisement in the SAR magazine. If your chapter places an advertisement in the SAR magazine, then you get 20 points per column inch.
- 1C Publicity through print, social and broadcast media. Where the SAR is prominently pictured, depicted or described. You get 50 points per article. If on broadcast media, it can only count once a day and if aired continuously, you may count up to 30 days of the article. An article posted by any organization can only be posted one time in this tab. Social media can only be counted the day they were posted. There is a 5,000 point maximum for chapters. Points over and above that can be counted towards the Virginia State Total.

Tab 2 – Speakers Bureau

- 2A Speakers Bureau that has been established for at least six months by the end of the contest year. It must be advertised on a website, social media or a publication with contact information provided. You will receive 25 points for this tab.
- 2B Classroom Presentations Historical, Educational and Patriotic supporting the goals and objectives of the SAR presentations give

to school-age children are counted as 25 points with 5 points if a compatriot giving the presentation is wearing colonial attire. Points are counted per presentation, not presenters. Presentations given to different classes or groups are counted separately. Request is made for number of attendees and SAR presenter.

2C – Historic, Educational and Patriotic Programs supporting the goals and objectives of the SAR are presented to a group. They can be either SAR or Non-SAR. You earn 25 points for Non-SAR and 10 for SAR presentations with a 5 point bonus for at least one compatriot wearing colonial attire. Points are earned per presentation, not number of presenters. Need number of attendees and SAR presenter.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR GRAVES

The Revolutionary Graves Committee is responsible for recognizing, honoring and registering patriot graves within the Commonwealth of Virginia. At the present time, we have three (3) programs we are pursuing in support the NSSAR goals.

We would like to have a biography posted at the Patriot Research System, NSSAR for every patriot ancestor of the each Virginia Compatriot and for those patriots who are buried in Virginia.
